<p>During this stage you will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Gather and process information about the planned initiative • Identify project partners • Understand the vision • Gain knowledge needed to be a contributing member of the stakeholder group, including building data literacy • Understand the benefits of an integrated data system 	<p>During this stage you will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Develop a deeper understanding of the scope of work • Identify how Part C/619 fit into the work • Clarify the expectations for your engagement in the development of the integrated data system • Plan ways to support your participation in the stakeholder group 	<p>During this stage you will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Develop and strengthen relationships with other stakeholders and leaders • Understand roles and responsibilities among stakeholders, balance of perspectives, group dynamics • Actively engage in the stakeholder engagement process by advocating for C/619 needs
<p>General Guiding Questions:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Who is leading the integrated data system work? Who else is participating as a stakeholder? • Why is the integrated data system needed? • What benefits and challenges of building and using the system has the state anticipated? • As the state considers the system, what might it look like? 	<p>Guiding Questions:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What questions do you hope to answer by using a data system? • How will answers to these questions help improve child and family outcomes? • What will be needed from each participant’s agency/program to sustain Part C/619 involvement in the stakeholder group? 	<p>Guiding Questions:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What are the timelines and priorities of the plan? • How will each agency have access to or “own” the data? • Are all voices in the group being heard and considered? • Am I an active participant in the group? If not, what is needed for my participation to increase?
<p>Specific Guiding Questions for Part C and 619:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What will be the benefit of the system for Part C/619 programs? • What questions does my program want to be able to answer that we can’t answer already? 	<p>Specific Guiding Questions for Part C and 619:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What Part C/619 data should be included in the system? • What data from other programs/agencies needs to be included for Part C/619 to be able to answer critical questions? • Who else within my agency has critical data systems knowledge that I need in order to be an effective participant in the stakeholder group? • What additional discussions and collaborations are needed within my program/agency? 	<p>Specific Guiding Questions for Part C and 619:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Where does Part C/619 fit into the state’s priority timelines? • Are Part C/619 needs for access, data and ability to answer critical questions being considered?

- Am I getting the information I need from leadership to make informed contributions to discussions?
- Is Part C/619 being adequately represented in the work?
